

What New Heights Offers

The comprehensive programming offered by New Heights supports children and youth on the autism spectrum and their families. Our programs are designed to support our population through the varying stages of their lives, from early childhood and into adulthood.

Home & Community Support Program

A play-based program that addresses developmental goals for children aged 2.5 to 7.



Preschool & Kindergarten Program

Focuses on each child's specific educational needs and provides the basis for intervention strategies for children aged 3 to 6.



School Program (Grades 1 to 12)

Helps students between 6 and 20 years of age overcome emotional challenges, develop positive peer relationships, and achieve academic success.



Transitional Support Programs

Supports young adults in developing the skills required to live independent, confident, and purposeful lives.



The Growing Need

In a 2018 report commissioned by Canada's Chief Public Health Officer, autism spectrum disorder was identified as the fastest growing and most commonly diagnosed neurological disorder in Canada. We have seen this trend reflected in our growing waitlists. Over 65 students are waiting for a spot in our School Program, and 48 for our Home & Community Program.

As families manage the physical, emotional, and financial challenges of their situations, our society must also find ways to mitigate the potential costs of the rising number of cases. When you partner with New Heights, you join the staff, students, and families as a team member committed to creating a better future for children and youth on the autism spectrum. Your support will enhance programs and services for the nearly 100 children, students, and young adults currently enrolled at New Heights. You will also help us to maintain a full range of supports focused on individual needs and goals.



Funding Priorities

1. PROGRAM INITIATIVES FUND - FUNDRAISING GOAL OF \$1 MILLION

Transition to Adulthood Program



Most government services and support for individuals on the autism spectrum end at the age of 18. This means as students graduate, they also age-out of other programs. Without help to move from school into adulthood, most students do not achieve independence from parents and family, have a tough time finding and maintaining employment, and struggle to build relationships.

- Self-advocacy


Employment Program



A staggering 75% of individuals with autism spectrum disorder struggle to find and maintain employment. Our dream is that every New Heights student will secure a job while they are still at New Heights and will receive the coaching they need to keep that job or find meaningful employment after graduating.

Your donation will support:

- Equipping New Heights high school students for employment
- Educating employers in Calgary about autism spectrum disorder
- Encouraging workplaces in Calgary to be inclusive of individuals with autism spectrum disorder



2. BUILDING FUND - FUNDRAISING GOAL OF \$700,000



In March 2017, we agreed to purchase the building adjacent to us, which will enable us to expand our student enrollment by 60% over the next three years. As the diagnosis rate of autism spectrum disorder rises, our existing space is already at capacity. There are 71 students enrolled for the 2019/20 school year with more than 65 students on the waitlist. Before expanding into the new space in July 2020, it requires the purchase of additional furniture and resources to ensure students get the education and support they need.

Your donation will be invested in:

- Furnishing classrooms and activity rooms
- Building a new life-skills room
- Developing a collaborative workspace and library
- Purchasing updated technology for teaching and learning

3. TUITION SUPPORT FUND - FUNDRAISING GOAL OF \$300,000



The average cost of education for a student with special needs in Alberta is \$40,000 per year. There is funding that covers some of that cost, but families still pay an annual tuition fee of \$12,000. Approximately 1 in 5 New Heights families cannot afford their child's tuition and require assistance.


- Ensure finances are not a barrier to high-quality education

Sustainability in Action

Our revenue goal for fiscal 2019/20 is \$4,161,553. In order for New Heights to grow while remaining fiscally responsible, we need to continue to fundraise for 7% of this revenue. As we look to expand our programming and increase our service offerings, we require an additional 4% to achieve this transformational growth. You are an integral part of our ability to achieve this goal.
